Underrepresented Students in STEM: Professors and Co-Directors of the Howard Hughes Medical Institute Program Vassie Ware and Neal Simon discussed Lehigh's innovative approach to retaining students in the STEM fields.

Writing a Bestseller: Stephanie Powell Watts, associate professor of English and author of the hit book, *No One Is Coming to Save Us*, discussed her writing process and her inspiration, and answered questions about the book.



A Footbridge for Panamanian Rice Farmers

SEVERAL HUNDRED KILOMETERS OUTSIDE of Panama City, Panama, along the Rio Grande, a small community of about 200 rice farmers resides. The river is a dominant fixture in the village, one through which residents navigate on a daily basis. In times of heavy rain, however, the river becomes impossible to pass, trapping community members on either side, forcing them to wait—and sometimes sleep on the other side—until it is safe to cross again.

For years, the locals were told a bridge would be built, but to no avail.

When Katie (Kadlubak) Evenson '99, who enjoys taking part in outdoor activities, heard that her company, Parsons—a global engineering, construction, technical, and professional services firm—was partnering with the nonprofit Bridges to Prosperity to construct a bridge for the community, she was eager to get involved.

"I think a bridge will make a huge impact for the community and become a part of their day-to-day lives, as opposed to how it had been with always just having to deal with getting wet and being unsafe," she said.

Evenson, a vice president with Parsons on rotation in the Internal Audit department, spent nine days in summer 2017 with an 11-member team of coworkers from across the company, building a 47-meter suspension footbridge that enabled the community of rice farmers to safely access schools and healthcare facilities.

"We did everything from erecting the scaffolding to putting up the steel towers to nailing down the deck," she said.
"Although we all brought different backgrounds to the project, we all got our hands dirty doing everything."

When she arrived in Panama, Evenson was moved by the sight of community members coming down to the river, pausing to take off their shoes, and making the trek across the river. She heard stories of people drowning and an-

imals being washed away—risks that would be minimized with the construction of a safe footbridge.

"Every day, we would see a group of kids come down the hill and cross the (river). It was just what they knew," she said. "So for the kids who grow up with this new bridge, the difficulty of crossing the river will only be a faint memory."

Evenson has worked for Parsons since she graduated from Lehigh, starting as an environmental scientist. Over time, she served in various roles, including project management, business development, and operations. She also spent a few years working in the Middle East. In her current position with Internal Audit, she looks at the elements of the highest risks across the company and evaluates whether the company's largest and most technically complex projects satisfy regulatory and contractual requirements and best practices.

"Parsons is a global engineering company. We are always engaged in projects, first-of-a-kind projects, signature projects, or in meeting whatever challenges our customers need addressed," Evenson said. "To be able to step back and take the opportunity to give back to the world and to do good, is something that I don't think you should ever pass up." —Klaudia Jazwinska '18



Riding for a Cause

RAISING MONEY FOR CHARITY, Glenn Hirsch '72 finished a 17-year, 10,000-mile, bicycling journey on Dec. 29, as he rode the last 512 miles of his quest to cycle the perimeter of the continental United States.

Hirsch, who earned his Lehigh degree in biology and is a family physician, rode from Phoenix, Arizona, to the Santa Monica Pier in California to honor his nephew, Ian Besner, and raise research funds for the I Care I Cure Childhood Cancer Foundation created in 2007 by Ian's parents, Beth and Brad. The foundation is dedicated to finding gentler ways to treat childhood cancer without the side effects associated with traditional adult treatments.

Hirsch and his wife, Lynn, created I Care I Cure I Cycle in 2009 to raise money for the foundation and raise awareness about childhood cancer treatments. With Lynn as his support and gear assistant accompanying him in their car, they have raised about \$100,000 for the foundation. The treks for I Care I Cure include bicycling from Key West, Florida, to the Canadian border; from Seattle, Washington, to San Francisco; from New Orleans to Augustine. Florida: and from Phoenix to New Orleans.

Some of the challenges Hirsch faced riding—sometimes 100 miles a day—were eating every 20 miles to keep his body fueled, drinking enough to avoid dehydration, facing adverse weather conditions, losing cell phone communication with Lynn, being injured, getting lost, having flat tires, and keeping a motivated and positive attitude.

"When you have a difficult task, you can be overwhelmed," Hirsch said, and shared that his most demanding ride was in Wyoming where it was 104 degrees, a steady uphill climb, and 30 mph winds that gusted to 50 mph. "During my difficult days, I would think about Ian's journey and know that I could not hold a candle to that."

Two months after his first fundraising ride in 2000 from Seattle, Washington, to Washington, D.C., Hirsch had to take a brief break from cycling when he had a stress-related heart attack. After taking time to recover from double bypass surgery, he was back on his bike to train and rode the 75-mile Silver Comet Trail near Atlanta that leads to Alabama.

Hirsch estimates that he has biked 130,000 miles. Many of these miles were done to raise funds for charities including the American Lung Association and Arthritis Foundation, among others. Some of the most beautiful vistas that he has seen were the Pacific Northwest, the Badlands and the Rocky Mountains.

During the last 2.8 miles to the Santa Monica Pier, Hirsch was joined on bikes by his wife and other members of his family.

"As the Pacific Ocean came into sight, I felt a tremendous sense of pride and accomplishment," he said.— $Dawn\ Thren\ '21P$

Alumna Honored for Leadership

BETSY ZALAZNICK, WHO EARNED A MASTER'S DEGREE in educational administration from Lehigh in 1979, was recently honored for 20 years of leadership at Or Chadash, the Reform Temple of Hunterdon County in New Jersey.

Zalaznick, the director of the temple's religious school, received the inaugural Betsy Award, named in her honor, which is given to an individual who has demonstrated exceptional generosity, leadership and creativity to the Or Chadash community.

"Under Betsy's direction and guidance, the school's curriculum and activities have flourished with innovation and creativity," said Debbie Weiss, chair of The Betsy Award Committee. "Betsy has had a lasting impact on so many children who have attended our school."

Zalaznick, whose maiden name was Rabiner, overhauled the curriculum, expanding the B'nai Mitzvah program and adding teaching assistants and a preschool program. All of her positions at Or Chadash have been voluntary.

Last year, seeking to enroll her daughter in a program for adults with special needs, she broached the Shimon and Sara Birnbaum Jewish Community Center to create one. What began as an idea is now J Cares, a thriving program with a waiting list.

"What I do every year is I try to figure out how we can up the ante," said Zalaznick, who credits her time as a student in the College of Education with helping her develop leadership skills.

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This will be my second article featuring a living member of our class. This time I am writing about **Wes Wardell**, who now resides at 2601 Newell Drive in Wilmington, Del.

Wes and I have been lifelong friends, having been brought up together in East Orange, N.J. Our fathers, Walter Allen and Weston Wardell Sr. (known in college as "Whitey"), were both members of Lehigh Class of 1925. Wes and I attended Ashland Grammar School. An amusing event occurred while we were in third grade. Our mothers conspired to dress us both as Dutch girls for the Halloween afternoon trip back to school and the customary identity guessing by our teacher, Miss Gaynor. We were outfitted in very similar blue dresses, wigs and masks. We walked back to school, holding hands, and entered the school building via the girls' entrance. Even at that age, Wes was a fast runner, leading our class around the running track behind our school. Another memory we share is the Sunday afternoons at the Wardell Laundry in Newark. We pushed each other around in laundry carts while Mr. Wardell worked on his ledgers. Due to the pressures of the Great Depression, the laundry business failed, and the Wardell family was forced to sell their home and business and move away to Monmouth Beach, N.J. Enter another member of the

Class of 1925: Larry Kingham. Through this connection, Mr. Wardell landed a job at the Lackawanna Works of Bethlehem Steel. The Wardell family relocated again, this time to Blasdell, N.Y., near Lackawanna and Buffalo, where Wes finished grade school and high school. His favorite teacher was a Mr. Alvin Stone who taught chemistry and physics and cultivated Wes's interest in chemistry. An acquaintance was a cute girl named Catherine, known as Kate, who lived nearby. She took mechanical drawing and shop with the boys. Wes and Kate went to the same church and knew each other well, but did not date until much later.

Wes entered Lehigh in the fall of 1947 with most of us. He registered in the College of Arts and Sciences as a chemistry major and joined Alpha Chi Rho, then located at 233 W. Packer Ave. During his college years, Wes participated in crosscountry and track and was a four-year student in ROTC, receiving a commission as a second lieutenant in the Army along with his bachelor degree.

With the Korean War going on, Wes was activated. After some additional training, he was sent to Okinawa for two years and then reassigned in California, followed by the Army Chemical Center in Edgewood, Md. After active duty ended, Wes entered the reserve from which he eventually retired as a lieutenant colonel, and now enjoys a military pension.

In 1954, Wes entered the University of Buffalo Law School on the GI Bill. Living at home, he was urged by his mother and grandmother to go call on that cute girl named Kate. He finally did. They were married during law school. After receiving his degree in 1957, and passing the N.Y. bar, Wes was pointed toward a corporate career. counties. Over 9,000 houses burned. Whole communities are gone. Hundreds of square miles of mountains and woodlands are ashes. Worst of all, 43 lives were lost. It could have been a lot worse if the fire officials and cops that first night hadn't plunged through the flames to save people.

"Around midnight, my wife, Susanna, came to my office, where I was working late, and said 'We've got to get out of here.' I grabbed my computer and some folders of my artwork, she grabbed our dog, cat and chinchilla, and we hightailed it off our hill. We could see the village of Kenwood burning below us and fire moving rapidly toward us. We drove through burning woods into pure chaos-firemen, first responders, EMTs, police bravely trying to reach people in their houses to get them evacuated. The buildings burned. We were stopped by police who said we couldn't go farther on the main road through town, but when the PG&E truck ahead of us went forward, we just ignored the cops and went behind it in its draft.

Francisco until we found a motel room for the night. Friends in Petaluma gave us a room at their house after that, where we camped for 12 days. On Oct. 9, I ignored the cops stopping people going back toward Kenwood and went to check on our house. A neighbor's house two doors down from ours burned down. Two others on our hill burned. The fires came up to our property line and stopped. Our house was okay, although it was three weeks and more before we had power, phone, water or internet service restored. Thank God the house didn't burn down and we're all safe, but I am so saddened by the misery and destruction visited upon our beautiful Sonoma County, including many right here who lost their houses."

Harry Carothers and I had a long chat recalling that we had served together in Washington and shared many Air Force

career experiences. Harry has been living in the Tampa area for 23 years. He entered the Air Force after we graduated from Lehigh, and went through pilot training in Texas. Laura and husband Evan Lareau of Northampton, and daughter Holly and husband Christopher McGann of Chula Vista, Calif., and two granddaughters.







REMEMBERING Les Whitten '50



Journalist, Novelist, Poet

Whitten was best known for his investigative journalism during the Watergate era

LES WHITTEN '50 '90H, AN INFLUENTIAL INVESTIGATIVE JOURNALIST who often returned to Lehigh to share his expertise with students, passed away Dec. 2, 2017.

A novelist, poet, and teacher, Whitten was best known for his career as a muck-raking journalist during the Watergate era.

Before he even began teaching at Lehigh, Jack Lule, chair of Lehigh's Department of Journalism, knew of Whitten's work. "He had an extraordinary career. Les was in the middle of Watergate," he commented. "He was a really good reporter

that would just get on a story and just keep reporting it and keep reporting it and keep reporting it."

Whitten's career in journalism began at Lehigh. At the urging of his father, Whitten initially studied civil engineering. He left the university for two years of Army service and then returned to pursue a degree in English and journalism. He served as editor-in-chief for *The Brown and White* and was an aspiring novelist.

For the Winter 2005 Alumni

Bulletin, Whitten reflected on his Lehigh days, crediting the university with playing a key role in his success. "I was clay and made into a statue of sorts…crafted into a writer and a poet and a novelist," he said. "Maybe it would have happened had I attended a different school, but I don't know."

He said, "I was a piece of work at Lehigh—here's an engineering school with this guy who is in love with literature. I used to go up in the stacks at Linderman Library, and it was Carl Sandburg writing about the cool tombs. When I got up there in that library, I was in pig heaven. I could look at all the book covers. And I loved Lehigh because of its unconditional love. Lehigh let me be whoever I wanted to be as long as I produced."

After graduation in 1950, Whitten worked for Radio Free Europe, *The Washington Post*, and the Hearst Corp. In 1969, he joined Jack Anderson's "Washington Merry-Go-Round" as a syndicated columnist, uncovering corporate and political scandals. His aggressive and sometimes questionable style of journalism put him at odds with President Richard M. Nixon and at the center of numerous political scandals and controversies.

Whitten left full-time reporting in the late 1970s, going on to publish 17 books, including poetry, a biography, a children's book, and a murder mystery. He was especially influential as an author in the vampire and werewolf horror genre. One novel, *Moon of the Wolf*, was made into a 1970s ABC Movie of the Week.

Throughout the years, Whitten remained a regular follower of *The Brown and White* and stayed in tune with the life of the university, often chiming in with letters to the editors on campus issues.

He returned to Lehigh as a visiting professor for creative writing and to lecture on investigative reporting. In 1988, he donated his papers and memorabilia to the university's Special Collections. The papers include political writings, manuscript drafts, letters he wrote to his family, and even a draft of his unfinished first novel, which was loosely based on his Lehigh days. He was awarded an honorary degree by Lehigh in 1990.

Whitten's classmate, Herb Siegel '50,

created an endowed scholarship in his honor in 2001. The Leslie H. Whitten Jr. Scholarship Fund, awarded to journalism majors, has benefitted 19 students since its inception. Past recipients have gone on to become writers, reporters, producers, professors and more.

Lule remembers Whitten's personal touch. "Not that long ago, I saw he had translated a book of poems, and I had written to him about it," said Lule. "The next thing you know, we had a box of the poems, and he had autographed a copy of the book for every one of the Journalism majors. That's the kind of guy he was. It just shows the kind of care he had for Lehigh."



Supported the Underdog

DEFENSE ATTORNEY AND COMMUNITY LEADER John C. Lowe'57 was an advocate and an optimist, often performing pro bono work to help those in need during his five-decade career.

"With his help of others with his legal work, he really became threaded into the community," said his son, Christian, who was impressed as a boy by his father's willingness to take on tough cases. He said his father

accepted meals as payment for legal services, and if his clients needed a place to stay, he brought them home.

Litigating on the local, state, and national stage, Lowe is credited with persuading ground-breaking decisions such as the University of Virginia admitting women in 1970. tection for advertising, and a case that convinced the Supreme Court of Virginia to strike down the Virginia Riot Act, which allowed police to arrest people congregating in groups of more than two and which was used to arrest 68 anti-war, student protesters in 1970.

Lowe also was involved in the community; he was a longtime director at Camp Faith, a free summer day camp in Virginia known for feeding children thousands of peanut butter and jelly sandwiches.

Born in Allentown, Pennsylvania, Lowe graduated high school at 16 and received his degree in chemistry from Lehigh University in 1957. He served in the Army after graduation and left with the rank of captain in 1964. He earned his law degree at the University of Virginia School of Law three years later. Lowe passed away on Oct. 15, 2017.

REMEMBERING Donald M. Bolle '50

A Visionary Leader

Donald M. Bolle served as dean of engineering in 14-year career at Lehigh



DONALD M. BOLLE, WHO SERVED AS DEAN OF ENGINEERING and filled several other leadership roles during a 14-year career with Lehigh, died Oct. 24 at his home in Coopersburg, Pennsylvania. He was 84 years old.

Born in Amsterdam in The Netherlands, Bolle joined the Lehigh faculty in 1980 as chairman of the department of electrical engineering. One year later, he became dean of what was then called the College of Engineering and Physical Sciences, a position he held until 1988.

Bolle left Lehigh that year to become provost and senior vice president for academic affairs at The Polytechnic Institute in Brooklyn, New York, He returned to Lehigh in 1999 to assume the position of vice provost of information resources. He later served as interim chair of the department of electrical and computer engineering and as adjunct professor before retiring in 2005.

Bolle's colleagues remember him as a gracious and thoughtful man and as an energetic, visionary leader who promoted the interests of faculty and staff members. During his tenure as engineering dean, he actively supported the university's purchase of the Mountaintop Campus in 1986, the creation of new research centers, and the movement of the chemistry and physics departments from the engineering college into the College of Arts and Sciences.

"Don was a very important member of my team at Lehigh, always thoughtful in his opinions and articulate in his expression of views strongly held," said Peter Likins, who served as president of Lehigh from 1982 to 1997. "The quality of Don's education was apparent in the range of his knowledge and the grace with which he could discuss issues well beyond the customary domain of the engineering world. He was an engaging personality; I can hear his chuckle as I resurrect our team meetings in my mind."

"Don Bolle was a loyal friend, a great scholar and an academic leader who always placed Lehigh's interest above everything else," said Mohamed El-Aasser, professor

of chemical engineering and former university provost and engineering dean. "Above all he was a wonderful human being with a superb character and a good sense of humor. He will truly be missed."

Svetlana Tatic-Lucic, associate dean for faculty development in the P.C. Rossin College of Engineering and Applied Science, called Bolle "a born leader who exuded self-confidence. He had no difficulty making a decision, and he usually made the right one. He was very supportive of professors."

Yong W. Kim, professor of physics and former chair of the department, said Bolle offered unwavering support when the physics department expanded its faculty base and made major capital improvements in the 1980s.

"He had a clear vision for Lehigh as a nationally ranked research university, and he had high hopes for physics," Kim said. "A consummate gentleman, he patiently championed our call for physics development."

"Don Bolle really wanted to do things to move Lehigh forward," said W. Beall Fowler, professor emeritus of physics, former department chair and former interim dean in the College of Arts and Sciences. "He and Peter Likins were two very energetic people, and they collaborated on some important projects. Don was very focused on improving things. He really wanted us to live up to our potential."

Bolle earned his bachelor's degree and Ph.D., both in electrical engineering, from Kings College in England and Purdue University respectively.

Before joining the Lehigh faculty, he was a research engineer with Electrical Musical Instruments in Middlesex, England, a professor at Purdue from 1956 to 1962, a National Science Foundation postdoctoral fellow in applied mathematics and theoretical physics the following year at Cambridge University, and a professor at Brown University from 1963 to 1980. Bolle served as provost at The Polytechnic University from 1988 to 1999.

A Life Fellow of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers, Bolle received the IEEE Centennial Medal, the IEEE Council on Oceanic Engineering Distinguished Services Award and the IEEE Millennium Medal. He was the founding editor and former editor-in-chief of the IEEE Transactions on Ocean Engineering.—Kurt Pfitzer
