Mine is sitting for a final exam in chemical engineering as the piles for Fritz Lab were being put in place and Dr. Foust was up front with his pipe emitting billows of smoke. There was some electricity problem, so lights in the exam room were out. Dr. Foust had a unique way of saying "bone dry" when referring to lack of moisture in air.

Now Marty: "Dear Burt, Although I graduated in the Class of 1955, I should have been in the Class of 1951. The Korean War came along, and I spent four years as a Navy corpsman before returning to Lehigh as a pre-med. After Lehigh, I spent four years at Hahnemann Medical College, one year as an intern at Allentown Hospital, and two years at St. Christopher's Hospital for Children. Then I practiced pediatrics in Allentown for 50 years.

"My story is about Dr. Fran Trembley. He was my botany and genetics professor at Lehigh. He was a chain smoker and even smoked during class. As an expert botanist, he wrote articles in *The Morning Call*. In his waning years he suffered severe COPD.

Leon assures us he has a dining room in mind at Saucon Valley Country Club ... in a location without stairs!

And speaking of reunions, I heard from our long-serving class treasurer, **Glenn Kinard**, who reports he's still working part-time at Air Products around 20 hours per week. My wife and I exercise with a personal trainer. She worked us in a group before COVID, and she asked if she could train us while under siege. So, we did. She works us hard twice a week, and we exercise the other days without her. In bad weather I do the stairs instead of walking outside; 14 of them up and down in one cycle, and I do 60 cycles minimum. Takes 40 minutes. I am shooting for 30 minutes. I am under 170 pounds for the first time since my sophomore year at Lehigh. I still look like an old man!"

Dick Topping was in my (Bob's) pledge class in then Theta Kappa Phi (now Phi Kappa Theta), and after a recent "what ever happened to" conversation with fraternity brother **Gerard Downey**, I thought I would ask Dick about his life after Lehigh. And what a life!

"Chapter I: After graduating, I enlisted in the Army to (1) avoid the draft and (2) continue my Russian studies at the Army Language School in Monterey. Next step: fly back to the East Coast to marry Mary Ann, my bride of 60 years, before departing for Berlin, where I spent 19 months monitoring Soviet troop movements around the city. Mary Ann joined me there in June 1961, and we shared some great and some 'not-so-great' moments before returning home in August 1962-preparing food packages for East German refugees in the Marienfelde transit center before that damned 'wall' went up on August 13, watching West Berlin police officers drag the Teltow Canal for the body of a would-be refugee two weeks later and living through the U.S.-Soviet tank 'standoff' at Checkpoint Charlie in October.

"Chapter II: After three years at Columbia Russian Institute, I joined the CIA and spent the next 28 years keeping tabs on our friends in the Kremlin. During my last two years at the Agency, I worked on an 'important counterintelligence project' (so help me, that's what the plaque and citations all say). I'd provide more in the way of details, but then ...

"Chapter III: We relocated to Belfast, Maine, in early June 1995, three weeks before I formally retired from the agency. Life here has us making new friends, entertaining family members and others 'from away' who can't get enough lobster, and seeing more of the U.S. and other parts of the world."

Another member of my freshman pledge class, Andre Le Gallo '61, also was a career CIA operative, and **Joe Montville** was a career foreign service officer—interesting when you consider most non-alums think all Lehigh grads are engineers.

Littleson, who is the oldest son of Everett (Rhett) Stellan Smith. had come across the Spring Lehigh Bulletin while in Newark Airport waiting for a flight home to Alaska. He remembered his dad having often talked about Lehigh during long winter nights in their dry hut above the Arctic Circle. Rhett was little known and seldom seen on campus. In fact, he is not to be found on our class list or in the 1964 Epitome, but Littleson is sure he attended Lehigh and that his dad said he was part of our class. Classmate **Gene Dykes** has done it again. On June 13, the Bala Cynwyd, Pa., runner (73) shattered the 50-kilometer world record (that's 31.07 miles) for his age group, with a time of 3:56:43. That was more than 19 minutes faster than the old record. He maintained an average pace of 7:37/mile—faster than most run for one mile, let alone 31. The self-described "Ultrageezer" did it with humor: "It's good to see I haven't gotten old," he told *Runner's World*. Gene set the record at a USA Track & Field event in East Islip, N.Y. The old mark of 4:15:55 was set by a German in 1997. Dykes holds the unofficial world record for the marathon in his age group, with a 2:54:23 in Florida, in 2018. That race wasn't sanctioned by the USATF, so he'll try again in October at the London Marathon.

The retired computer programmer is so unusual that researchers subjected him to a battery of physical tests for a 2019 article in the New England Journal of Medicine. To set the marathon record, he'll have to run nearly a minute per mile faster than he did in the 50K. He's ready: "Don't be afraid of getting old, to try new things in running. Just enjoy it and get out there and do it."

Aye, aye, Captain Dykes; so much for my pride in climbing two Colorado 14ers at age 50 (yawn).

I wrote about it two columns back as part of my reporting on an unofficial, COVID-appropriate flag presentation to the Class of 2024, which includes **Andy Shmerler's** son, Harry. Class President **Gus Gustafson**, Andy, **Ed Purdy** and I were our class representatives for the safely masked presentation in front of the UC.

Here's what I wrote: "Andy was the manager of the Marching 97, architect of one of my favorite Lehigh memories, the day women were introduced to the band in very dramatic fashion. Fans in Taylor Stadium didn't know women were marching until they removed their hats and shook out their hair at halftime as the band played 'Everybody Takes Their Hats Off to Lehigh."

Nick Noel was the first to jump on me. "Just enjoyed your column for our Class of '74," he wrote. "One edit, however. I distinctly remember the Marching 97 playing 'Nothing Like a Dame,' from the musical 'South Pacific,' when the coeds doffed their hats and marched to the sideline. They probably played 'Hats Off to Lehigh' as well, but the 'Nothing Like a Dame' song, I thought, was hysterical. Having been in 'South Pacific' in high school, the song resonated with me as I had a brief solo in it!"

Mike Hahn '78 also responded. "I enjoyed reading your column in the recent Lehigh Alumni Bulletin. It was nice to read again the story about introducing women into the Marching 97. Although I didn't join the band until the following year, I read about it in The Brown and White. I think you got one detail wrong. The band spelled out 'DAMES' in a sweep, and the women doffed their shakos to the tune of 'There Is Nothing Like a Dame.' Glad to hear Andy Shmerler is still alive and kicking."

As it happens, I wrote about this in a long-ago edition of the *Bulletin* as part of a retrospective on historic moments in Taylor Stadium, former home of Lehigh football games. I called Andy back then to make sure I had it right, and I gave readers the full story, as opposed to the truncated one I included in the recent class column.

As a result, I knew we all had it right. But I called Andy again to confirm.

Some of you will recall that this was controversial at the time. With women newly introduced to Lehigh, the band was under pressure to open its ranks, and *The Brown and White* had reported resistance. So, when the Marching 97 began its sweep that Saturday afternoon, playing "There Is Nothing Like a Dame" and forming the word "DAMES," some fans took this as a gesture of defiance. Andy recalls some of them even began booing.

Then some band members

broke away and marched to the sidelines. "Ladies, doff your headgear," the announcer said and the women removed their shakos and shook out their hair as the band played "Everybody Takes Their Hats Off to Lehigh" and the shocked crowd roared with delight.

It was an unforgettable moment.

I also promised you a more complete report on Andy's post-Lehigh life. That's still in the works, but I'll note that he returned last August for the delayed official flag presentation to his son and the rest of our adopted class.

I'll tell you more about that and, I hope, the life of Andy Shmerler—next time.

REMEMBERING Berry G. Richards



A Pioneer in Library Tech

Berry G. Richards was the first woman director of libraries at Lehigh

PIONEERS OFTEN FEEL A SPECIAL responsibility to ease the way for those who come after them, and Berry G. Richards, the first woman director of libraries at Lehigh, met that challenge with foresight and verve, embracing the digital revolution and instituting innovative library technologies.

Yet Richards, who died July 15, 2021, at age 90, never lost her love of books or short-changed her relationships with staff, faculty and students as she helped shepherd library advancements.

... what kind of technology could be used for libraries.

She could foresee how technology was going to move us forward." Greg Reihman, vice provost for library and technology services, says, "She was using words like 'virtual library' back in 1978. She not only had that vision, she was capable of pulling that off. It says something about not just her intellect but also her character, that she pulled that off with collegiality, warmth and generosity."

Richards started as assistant director in charge of the new Mart Library in 1969 and

was named libraries director in 1976. She managed the establishment of the first fully functional online interactive information retrieval system, developed by the late Lehigh computer science professor Donald Hillman in the early 1970s. It was called LEADERMART—Lehigh Automatic Device for Efficient Retrieval plus "MART" for the Mart Library, a portion of what is now the E.W. Fairchild-Martindale Library. By the mid-'80s, Lehigh had an automated catalog system named Asa for looking up books and managing collections.

Richards helped plan the construction of the E.W. Fairchild-Martindale Library and Bayer Galleria of Rare Books. She played a key role in the formation of the university's Special Collections and in founding the Friends of the Lehigh University Libraries.

Even while managing such large projects and responsibilities, she practiced kindness and generosity with staff and collaborated well with faculty, colleagues say.

"She was just so lovely," Wiles-Young said. "She was so helpful when I interviewed for the job at Lehigh. She made great partnerships with faculty. She was inclusive before the word *inclusion* was talked about."

One year, Richards organized a bus trip to take the libraries' staff to visit the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C. Other times, she planned picnics for the department and brought in outside speakers. "She was someone who built connections, who inspired her staff," Reihman said.

Richards served on the boards of several library, educational and civic groups and received the Lehigh University Hillman Faculty and Paul Frantz Administration Awards, as well as the SUNY Albany Distinguished Alumna Award.

The daughter of Greek immigrants, Richards

grew up bilingual in North Adams, Massachusetts, often acting as an interpreter for her parents. She excelled in school from an early age, skipping two grades to become the youngest graduate of her high school class. She received a full scholarship to Vassar College and earned a master's degree

from SUNY Albany. She also took post-graduate work at Drexel University.

"She was what we Bostonians would call 'wicked smart,'" Richards' sister Artemis Kirk, recalled in a eulogy at Richards' funeral at St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church in Bethlehem in July. "Berry was an omnivorous reader from early childhood, and nearly all her life she requested books as gifts. Her literary tastes were wide-ranging from A to Z: *Absalom, Absalom* to *Zen and the Art of Motorcycle Maintenance.*"

Richards was a devotee of the Bethlehem Area Public Library who frequently returned books late. When she retired from Lehigh in 1995, the Bethlehem library director joked that since Richards would have time to return books promptly, the city would need to raise taxes to compensate for the lack of revenue from overdue book fines.

Friends described Richards as caring and compassionate, wise and generous to friends, multiple charities and animals alike. Kirk, who followed in her sister's vocational footsteps, becoming the university librarian at Georgetown University before retiring, said her sister cared for a collection of strays and "pre-owned cats outside on her patio."

"Some people like Berry collect friends like stray cats," Kirk said. "Berry also collected stray cats like friends."

Daniel Traister, curator of the Kislak Center for Special Collections, Rare Books and Manuscripts at the University of Pennsylvania, whom Richards hired years ago as a consultant to assess Lehigh's collections, recalls how Richards' mild-mannered demeanor belied her steely inner resolve to get things done.

"The cat lady appearance masked an inner lion," Traister said.

In addition to Kirk, Richards is survived by a niece, nephew and other family members, including cousins in the U.S. and Greece. Burial will be in Massachusetts. —*Margie Peterson* the Fleetwood School District, where he taught social studies, chaired the social studies department, served as assistant principal and ultimately retired as the Fleetwood High School principal. He also coached several of the school sports teams and was inducted into the Fleetwood Sports Hall of Fame.
